

REMEMBERING FORMER MAYOR FRED ECKHARDT

Fred Eckhardt, former Mayor of Montville Township, passed away on September 1, 2009. Mr. Eckhardt was the epitome of civil service, serving on the Montville Township Committee from 1966 to 1992, 18 of the 27 years (1972-1989) as Mayor.

His service was not limited to the Governing Body; he was also an active member of the Turkey Mountain/Pyramid Mountain Committee, Environmental Commission, Open Space Committee, Planning Board, Library Board of Trustees, Board of Education, Republican County Committee, Republican Club and Kiwanis Club. Mr. Eckhardt worked tirelessly as a volunteer with the Baseball Softball Association (MBSA), Bronco's Wrestling, and many other youth activities.

As a result of the service Fred Eckhardt gave to his community, he was the recipient of countless awards too numerous to mention here. Most recently, Mr. Eckhardt was honored at the 2008 Arbor Day Ceremony for his decades of service to the Township of Montville.

The thoughts and prayers of a grateful community go out to Fred Eckhardt and his family and friends.

GENERAL ELECTION TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 3 VOTER REGISTRATION AND ABSENTEE BALLOT INFORMATION

The General Election is Tuesday, November 3, 2009. Polls are open from 6 a.m. to 8 p.m. **PLEASE BE SURE TO CHECK THE SAMPLE BALLOT YOU RECEIVE IN THE MAIL FOR YOUR VOTING LOCATION.**

VOTER REGISTRATION: In order to be eligible to vote in an election, you must be registered 21 days prior to the election date. The deadline for voter registration for the General Election is October 13. Voter registration forms may be obtained from the Montville Township Municipal Building, 195 Changebridge Road, Montville, or by contacting the Township Clerk at 973-331-3304 or tatkinson@montvillenj.org. You may also go online at www.morriselections.org and print out the form.

If you are already registered to vote but your address has changed, you must follow this procedure: If you have moved WITHIN Morris County, fill out a change in address form. If you have moved into Montville Township from a county other than Morris, you must re-register to vote by filling out a voter registration form. All forms are available at the Municipal Building or at www.morriselections.org.

VOTING BY ABSENTEE BALLOT: If you anticipate not being able to get to the polls to vote on November 3, you may vote by absentee ballot. You must first apply for the absentee ballot. The deadline for the Morris County Clerk to receive absentee ballot applications by mail is October 27. Please request your ballots early if you know you are going to be out-of-town or traveling! Once they receive your application, they will mail you an absentee ballot, which must be returned to the Morris County Clerk by mail or in person by November 3 at 8 p.m. If you have any questions regarding absentee voting or would like to request an absentee ballot application, please call the Township Clerk at 973-331-3304, e-mail tatkinson@montvillenj.org, or visit the Morris County Clerk's website at www.clerk.morris.nj.us to print one out.

NEW GI BILL TAKES EFFECT

On August 1, 2009, the new GI Bill for the 21st Century officially took effect, greatly expanding educational opportunities to troops who have served since 9/11 and their families.

The launch of the program represented a major milestone in the decade-long VFW fight for educational benefits that properly honor wartime service. The “Post 9/11 Veterans Educational Assistance Act” was signed into law in 2008.

The new GI Bill will pay the highest in-state public tuition rate, and provide for books, fees and a living stipend. It eliminates the \$1,200 enrollment fee, extends the use-or-lose benefit requirement from 10 to 15 years and greatly enhances the amount paid to Guard and Reserve members, among other improvements.

Since its passage, VFW has been working closely with the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) to ensure the implementation of these new benefits goes as smoothly as possible. VFW service officers across the nation have also been trained to help eligible veterans utilize the new program.

RUGGERS PART OF GUINNESS BOOK OF WORLD RECORDS

Eight teams from The Montville Wanderers Youth Rugby program were among the 832 kids on 95 teams competing in the New Jersey American Flag Rugby Associations tournament held at Black River Fields on Saturday July 25th. The tournament was sponsored by the Morris Rugby Corporation and expected to exceed the current record documented on March 19, 2008, at the Tag Rugby Festival which was held in the United Kingdom. That record-setting tournament had 487 players on 48 teams, said KJ Feury, Guinness record coordinator for the Morris Rugby Corp.

Chester fire officials were reviewing Guinness record documentation of the tournament, which will then be notarized and sent to Guinness World Record headquarters in England next week, KJ Feury said. Within a few weeks, Morris Rugby should hear from Guinness to confirm whether it officially broke the record.

Saturday's tournament marked the 10th American Flag Rugby Youth Festival sponsored by the Morris Rugby Corp.

Morris Youth Rugby, a division of Morris Rugby Corp., was founded 11 years ago by KJ Feury's husband Tom Feury, 48, of Denville. It comprises about 80 teams from eight different towns in Morris County. It serves boys and girls from as young as 5 years old, who play a non contact version of the game, to those in high school who play the full-contact version.

Additional teams that are not part of Morris Youth Rugby — teams from Sussex, Union and Bergen counties — also played at Saturday's tournament. The tournament was judged by 28 referees, all teenagers who formerly played flag rugby for the organization, KJ Feury said.

When Craig Chapman, 50 of Pine Brook started the Montville program in 2000 there were only 25 kids involved and the first festival was hosted by Montville and they played Denville which was the only other team at the time. In fact Montville hosted the first 3 festivals. Now, the Morris Rugby portion of the program has grown to about 1,000 boys and girls.

Dennis Gibson, 58, of Montville is the president of the Morris Rugby Corp. A native of England, where rugby is popular, Gibson grew up playing the sport. Seeing the youth tournament is something that makes Gibson glad, he said. And a possible Guinness world record? That's just icing on the cake. "The event isn't about breaking records. It's just a by product of (the game). This is just a fun day for the kids," he said.



HAVE YOU NOTICED THE TEAL RIBBONS?

In September, thousands of volunteers will once again branch out across the Garden State to “Turn the Towns Teal,” the third annual campaign to help spread awareness of ovarian cancer throughout New Jersey. With township approval, teal ribbons will be tied around trees, mailboxes, at public buildings and stores, and along main thoroughfares throughout the state to raise awareness of ovarian cancer.

The disease earns its “silent” moniker because the symptoms are often masked; causing the cancer to go unnoticed and, in many cases, misdiagnosed. As a result, the ovarian cancer is often confirmed only later, in its more life-threatening stages, when treatment options and chances of long-term survival are greatly reduced. If ovarian cancer is found before it spreads outside the ovary, 90%-95% of women will survive at least five years. However, only 19% of ovarian cancers are found at this stage. Thus, the five-year survival rate is 44%.

Clearly, early-stage detection of ovarian cancer is the best way to improve survival. Even though the symptoms are very subtle, especially in the early stages, they still should be noted and addressed with your doctor.

A Pap Smear DOES NOT detect Ovarian Cancer!

Ovarian Cancer Whispers....So Listen

Here are some of the warning signs of ovarian cancer:

- Discomfort in the abdominal/pelvic region
- Swelling of the stomach (abdomen)
- Continuous fatigue
- Unusual weight gain or loss, notably in the abdominal area
- Ongoing gastrointestinal complaints including nausea, indigestion and/or gas
- Frequent urination (in absence of an infection)
- Pain during intercourse
- Bleeding between periods or after menopause

The success of our awareness campaign depends upon volunteers. EAGLE SCOUT AWARDS

Kyle Beiremeister, Christopher McGuire, and Christopher Preciado were awarded the rank of Eagle Scout by Troop 74 on Sunday, May 30th in the presence of family, friends, and invited guests. This is quite an accomplishment, since only four percent of all boy scouts have the necessary perseverance, dedication, and leadership skills to earn Scouting's highest award. An Eagle Scout candidate must show leadership, organization, and communication skills by planning and implementing a service project.

Kyle Beiremeister's project involved improvements to the Montville dog park. He power-washed the reclaimed sewer pieces and prepared them for paint. They were painted and stenciled with paw prints. The fences were disassembled and power-washed, and then each piece was stained. Landscape fabric was installed around the trees, and fresh gravel placed on top of the fabric prior to the fences being assembled back into place. Two agility bridges were constructed and placed in the park. The sign and planter near the parking area were stained, and the two fire hydrants were repainted.

Christopher McGuire landscaped and beautified 14 islands at the Towaco Train Station. The islands were overgrown with weeds, and the winter snow was killing the shrubs. With the help of his fellow scouts and volunteers, he removed the weeds and dead shrubs, placed weed mat down, and then put river rocks on top.

He turned a classroom that had been used for storage in the educational building into a library and reading room for Sunday School children and parishioners to use. With the help of boys in Troop 74, Christopher removed everything from the room, and separated items to be kept from those to be disposed of. They scrubbed the floor, walls, window and door frames and replaced damaged ceiling tiles. The entire room was then painted. New wooden window sills were installed and stained. Finally, bookshelves were set up in the room, and the existing book collection was organized. Chairs, small tables, lamps, and rugs were placed in the room to create comfortable reading areas.

The boys thanked everybody who assisted them with their Eagle projects, as well as the adult leaders and fellow boy scouts of Troop 74 who made their scouting careers such a memorable learning experience. Surely, the skills they learned along Scouting's trail will prove invaluable no matter where life's path may lead them.

TOWNSHIP STUDYING WATER RATE STRUCTURE

It is necessary that the Township of Montville adjust the water rate structure in order to increase revenues to meet anticipated increases in water expenses and budgets. The methodology followed in the study is similar to that which was followed for last year's sewer rate study. The Township's Long Term Financial Planning Committee (LTFPC) utilized a four (4) year budget projection to determine the revenue necessary to cover water rates through 2013. The Township Committee is now reviewing the LTFPC's recommendation. The new rate is projected to take effect January 1, 2010. The basic analytical assumptions for the increased expenses and changes in the rate methodology are as follows:

- A new base rate has been established to covered fixed costs.
- High seasonal demand due to summer water use necessitates the Township contracting to purchase water at an increase cost to insure adequate supply.
- The rate structure is designed to encourage water conservation for non-essential use of potable water.
- Electric utility rates are not only impacting the water operation generally, but they are contributing to severe increases in treatment costs.

To view the rate structure recommended by the Long Term Financial Planning Committee, an analysis of the recommended rate structure's impact on individual bills, or to provide a comment to the Township that does not require a response, please go to the Township of Montville website at www.montvillenj.org.

The Township Committee will continue to review water rates at meetings open to the public. 

MONTVILLE'S MUNICIPAL MASTER PLAN

The Master Plan is the keystone of municipal planning and possibly the most important tool available to direct and guide the use of land in our community. The Planning Board is the body empowered with the legal responsibility for preparing and, after public hearing, adopting or amending a master plan. The Planning Board recently adopted a re-examination report to address the State of New Jersey's Municipal Land Use Laws (MLUL) dictating this document be reviewed every six years. By addressing this, the Board can now use their energies towards providing a comprehensive review and analysis of the community in planning for the Township's future.

Master planning is an effective way to manage changes that occur naturally as the economy changes, new regulatory and governmental constraints are imposed, technology expands and demographics shift. The master planning process is one that has to be well thought about before embarked upon with as much objective information as possible gathered to complete a history and current status of the community's issues. The value of a master plan is multi-fold: it provides the overall picture of where our township is, what issues, if any, need to be addressed, and what changes and challenges might be expected to occur as we move into the future.

The Master Plan document when completed in early 2010 will detail the intent for future development in the community, setting out reasons for recommended policies and standards, and identifying where and how development should occur. The plan will only be completed after a complete and exhaustive analysis of the community's physical, economic and social conditions is made. The Planning Board will be working and meeting with many of the community's agencies, committees, boards and department heads and will have open public meetings looking for residents to participate. The wider the net is cast in terms of gathering information, the better the master plan is as a complete comprehensive guide that satisfies and addresses the goals and objectives of all areas of our community. This vision will guide us in maintaining quality of life issues so important to all of us.

The Master Plan, when completed, will enable the Township to respond to and set priorities among different levels of community needs. This can only be accomplished by listening to the needs of users, the goal being a consensus on community vision once all interested parties have given input.

Finally, the master plan is a living document. What is taking place now is making adjustments to the prior master plan to respond to the needs, goals and visions of today and the future and to maintain the desired quality of life for Montville. After this major planning task is completed, the town will move forward with implementing this vision by updating municipal ordinances with a goal to make the zoning provisions clear, fair and protective of our community character.

A Master Plan Review Committee, consisting of the Township's planner, Joseph Burgis, AICP, and members of the Planning Board, has begun the exhaustive and detailed collection of data and to focus on all of the areas the Planning Board will need to review as part of this process. The subcommittee meets generally at 6:00PM before the Regular meeting of the Planning Board held the second Thursday of each month (check calendars to confirm). The subcommittee intends on soliciting resident input in the near future to help define this future vision for Montville.

Adopted minutes of the Master Plan subcommittee are posted on the Township website, and watch for future postings and articles on the Master Plan as well on our web at www.MontvilleNJ.org. GUIDE TO H1N1 AND PANDEMIC FLU

Due to the attention given to swine flu and the possibility of an expanding pandemic flu situation, the Montville Township Health Department would like to share the following information on the subject which was obtained from a brochure developed by Picatinny.

Limit the Spread of H1N1

- Wash hands frequently with soap and water for at least 30 seconds
- Cover coughs and sneezes with tissues, dispose of tissue and then wash hands
- Cough or sneeze into your sleeve
- If you are sick, stay home and away from others as much as possible
- Don't send sick children to school
- Avoid close contact with people who are sick
- Use hand sanitizer
- Keep the work area and home clean by using a labeled household disinfectant or chlorine bleach mixture (1/4 cup chlorine bleach with 1 gallon water). Clean surfaces and commonly used items like microwaves, refrigerator handles, phones, remote controls, door knobs, light switches, etc.
- Stay healthy by eating a balanced diet and exercising daily.
- Get your vaccination as soon as they become available.

What is novel H1N1 Pandemic Influenza (Swine Flu)?

Novel H1N1 (referred to as “swine flu”) is a new influenza virus causing illness in people. This new virus was first detected in people in the United States in April 2009. The virus is spreading from person-to-person worldwide, probably in much the same way that regular seasonal influenza viruses spread. On June 11, 2009, the World Health Organization (WHO) signaled that a pandemic of novel H1N1 flu was underway.

What is the difference between a Seasonal Flu and a Pandemic Flu?

Seasonal Influenza

A respiratory illness that can be spread from person to person and is caused by human influenza viruses

Seasonal Influenza

Follows a predictable pattern, usually every winter, in temperate climates.

Most people have some immunity and a vaccine is available each year.

Normal flu symptoms; fever, cough, runny nose, and muscle pain.

Healthy adults are not usually at risk for any serious complications.

The medical community can usually meet public and patient needs.

Average number of deaths is about 36,000 each year.

Vaccines are developed before the flu season based on known virus strains.

Supplies of antiviral drugs are usually available.

Small impact on the community with sick people staying home from work or school.

Manageable impact on US and world economy

Pandemic Influenza

A global outbreak that occurs when a new strain of influenza virus appears in humans that can cause serious illness and spread easily from person to person

Pandemic Influenza

Doesn't happen often, only three times in the 20th century, last time was in 1968

Symptoms could be more serious and there could be more medical complications.

Healthy people may be at risk for serious complications.

The medical community will be overwhelmed.

The numbers of deaths would be much higher, possibly millions worldwide.

Vaccines need to be developed and may not be available for several months.

May not have any effective antiviral drugs or the supply may be limited.

Big impact on the community. There could be travel restrictions, school closings, limited business hours or closings, and canceling of public gatherings.

Try to answer the questions asked of you as best as possible so the proper emergency responders and equipment may be sent. Most importantly, do not hang up if you dial in error. Please stay on the line and alert the dispatcher to your mistake.

Help Us, Help You!

How can we provide a quick response to your location if we are unable to find you? Can you imagine calling the police for an emergency and you see police cars, fire trucks and ambulances riding up and down your street, but they can't find your house. Precious time can be wasted; minutes can mean a matter of life and death. Please clearly number your house using reflective numerals and be certain they are not less than three (3) inches in height.

Montville Township Ordinance 15.08.050- Display of numbers assigned:

The number so assigned to each building shall be displayed by the owner or occupant on the front of the building or in the front yard of the lot in clearly visible numerals not less than three (3) inches in height and so located as to be clearly visible to a person passing by the premises on the abutting street.

HOLIDAY COLLECTION SCHEDULE SOLID WASTE/RECYCLING/BRUSH/GRASS/ LEAVES

There will be no collection of Solid or Vegetative Waste on the following holidays:

**THANKSGIVING DAY; Thursday, November 26, SECTION I
CHRISTMAS DAY; Friday, December 25, SECTION II
NEW YEAR'S DAY; Friday, January 1, SECTION II**

If a holiday falls on your collection day, please put your items out on your next regularly scheduled day.

BRUSH / GRASS / LEAVES

The Vegetative Waste Program runs from April 1 through December. The last pickup in Section I will be Thursday, December 31 and due to the holiday schedule, the last day for pickup in Section 2 is Friday, December 18.

Brush should be bundled, with the maximum bundle size being two (2) feet in diameter, four (4) feet in length, weighing no more than fifty (50) pounds and tied so that one person can handle each bundle. Individual branches may not exceed four (4) inches in diameter. Grass/leaves may be put into containers or paper, biodegradable bags. Plastic bags cannot be used for any vegetative waste.

Township Code prohibits placing grass, leaves, vegetative waste, or any debris into roadways or drainage facilities, such as creeks, culverts, ditches, drains or drainage structures, gutters, pipes, streams or swales.

CHRISTMAS TREES

Christmas trees, with all lights and ornaments removed, will be collected throughout the Township on Friday, January 8 and Friday, January 15.

•**Organic Material** – Leaves, Grass Clippings, Brush. Must be placed in rigid containers or biodegradable bags and placed at curb. Collection will be from April through December section 1 will be on Thursday and 2 will be on Friday.

•**Metal Appliances** – PROVIDED WASTE MANAGEMENT HAS BEEN NOTIFIED AND ALL DOORS/LIDS HAVE BEEN REMOVED large metal appliances, previously referred to as 'white goods', can be placed at the curb on either the first or second regular trash pick-up day by 6 AM. To notify Waste Management to schedule the pick-up of a metal appliance call 973-383-7480 ext. 17242.

•**Paper** – Newspaper, Corrugated Cardboard, Mixed Paper (including magazines). Please bag (in a paper bag), bundle with twine, or placed in a rigid container at the curb to be picked up on alternating Wednesdays. **Hardcover Books** may also be placed out with paper as long as the front and back covers have been removed.

•**Wood Waste** – Branches no greater than 4 inches in diameter and no longer than 4 feet in length can be placed in bundles no greater than 2 feet in diameter. Each bundle must be tied at both ends so that 1 individual can pick it up. Collection will be from April through December sections 1 will be on Thursday and 2 will be on Friday.
