

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HURRICANE SANDY INFORMATION & STORM PREPARATION

Construction Code Permits:

On Tuesday, November 13, 2012 the Montville Township Committee adopted a resolution waiving the construction code permit fees for damage that occurred as a result of Hurricane Sandy. This waiver will be in place from October 30, 2012 to January 31, 2013 and is limited to repairs related to damage from the storm. Residents who experienced damage that will require construction code permits to correct should speak with the construction department at the Montville Township municipal building – 973-331-3318.

Brush/Tree Collection Procedures:

Vegetative waste is collected through the Township's curbside collection program on your first garbage collection day of the week; i.e. Section One (1) on Mondays and Section two (2) on Tuesdays. Following is how brush must be prepared for collection through the curbside program.

Brush can be bundled for collection with the maximum bundle size being two (2) feet in diameter, four (4) feet in length and weighing no more than fifty (50) pounds. Brush must be prepared so that each bundle can be handled by one person and branches must not exceed four (4) inches in diameter.

If you have brush or trees that are larger than what is included in the instructions outlined above, we ask that you **reduce the size of the trees or brush to the greatest extent you are able to accomplish. The goal should be to have material that one or two individuals, at most, can lift.** Once your brush/tree parts are reduced in size they should be placed at the curb and you can contact the Department of Public Works at 973-331-3324 to schedule collection. There are many residents who are working to remove large trees from their homes so we ask that you are patient as we work to assist everyone in need.

Storm Preparation:

Residents are advised to prepare for severe weather events or other disasters now, rather than the day before the storm. At a minimum, essential items like water, nonperishable food, batteries, flashlights, battery operated radios should be on hand or available. If you have your own well, are in an area that commonly experiences flooding or are aware of any other challenges consistently experienced during these events, prepare yourself accordingly. If you have a generator or pump, make sure they remain fueled and in receive regular maintenance to ensure they are in working order. For those with generators, please remember that gasoline and diesel fuel are hazardous materials. Besides being highly flammable, the fumes that come from these fuels while they are being transported and stored are extremely hazardous to your health.

HAPPY NEW YEAR!

In the aftermath of Hurricane Sandy your Township Committee wants to express our deepest gratitude to our first responders: the Police Department, our three Fire Departments, our First Aid Squad and our DPW who worked tirelessly through the storm and in the days following putting their lives on the line to insure your comfort, safety and security. We would also like to recognize the contributions of our Chief of Police, Rich Cook, as well as Captain Ed Rosellini who provided us with the only accurate information regarding JCP&L's presence throughout the restoration period. Our Office of Emergency Management, under the direction of Lt. Rudy Applemann, conducted daily briefings with Township administration and staff, Board of Education representatives, as well as your elected officials. We would also like to thank our Social Services staff, Nancy Mertz and Chris Ziolkowski, for their tireless efforts at our shelter locations. If you took advantage of these shelters you know firsthand what a great job they did and the sacrifices they made to comfort residents in need of the basic essentials. To those who donated food and personal items to the shelters, we thank you as well.

Besides the issue of power, the overwhelming complaint we received was that of communication; specifically, communication between JCP&L and the Township, between JCP&L and our residents, and between the Township Committee and our residents.

Regarding communication between JCP&L and the Township, we were assigned an area manager by JCP&L. It was his job to act as a liaison between the utility and the Township. This area manager appeared before the Township Committee one month prior to Sandy and assured us that JCP&L was prepared for anything, with a full complement of protocols for storm management and notifications. It became quite evident in the early hours following the storm that this new system failed.

You should know that in the first 10 days following the storm, we were able to make contact with our area manager exactly 4 times. Each time we were given information that was either incorrect or grossly inaccurate. It became abundantly clear to our Office of Emergency Management that it would be a disservice to you, our residents, to distribute this misinformation to the public. We continued to press for more reliable information, but our calls were not answered and not returned.

The only reliable source of information we had was from our Police Department and for that we are extremely grateful. Each night our police patrols would sur-

vey the entire Township and log which streets had power and which did not. This patrol was conducted each and every night.

On November 7, we received a communication from JCP&L listing the roads that were without power. We crossed this with our list from the previous night and determined that the JCP&L list omitted over 70 roads that were without power. We immediately sent JCP&L our list of roads without power. We also posted their list on the web, encouraging residents to call in, should their roads not be listed. This ensured that no one was overlooked.

As the Township Committee faces the challenges of the coming year we want to assure you that we are not only looking ahead but also looking to the past to take corrective actions should we find ourselves in another calamity like Hurricane Sandy. Specifically, we are looking at improving our emergency notification system, procuring generators for additional public facilities, and exploring ways to check up on our senior population, just to name a few. We are also working with neighboring towns to hold JCP&L accountable for their inadequate communication in the days following the storm. We will also pressure them to invest in improving the reliability of the power grid throughout the Township.

We certainly have a busy year ahead. We hope that the New Year brings you and your family health and prosperity!

Montville Rotary Club now meets at the I-Hop located in the Wal-Mart Plaza in Boonton every Wednesday at 7:30 a.m.


DOG LICENSES DUE IN JANUARY

New Jersey State Law requires that your dog be licensed by the time the dog is 7 months old or attains permanent teeth. Most dogs have permanent teeth by the time they are 5 to 5 ½ months of age. In addition, your dog must have a rabies inoculation in order to license.

From that time on, annually, in the month of January, the person owning, keeping, or harboring the dog shall purchase a license tag for that dog. The tag shall be securely fastened to a properly fitted collar. If you move into Montville, your dog must be licensed within ten days after moving in.

There are two licensing fees: a spayed/neutered dog costs \$15.00, a non-spayed/non-neutered dog cost \$20.00 to license. Once licensed with us, you will automatically be sent renewal forms each year at the beginning of January and you can renew your license by mail.

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STORMWATER MANAGEMENT

Township of Montville Stormwater Management Information Sheet

WHAT:

If you propose the addition of 150 sq. ft. or greater of impervious surfaces on your property the Montville Township Code (Chapter 230-112 through 230-114) requires stormwater management control in compliance with the N.J.D.E.P. Stormwater Best Management Practices Manual and/or the New Jersey Residential Site Improvement Standards. Examples of impervious surfaces include but are not limited to buildings, decks, patios, walks, and driveways.

In accordance with the code a Licensed Engineer or Architect must provide a stormwater management system design which includes evaluation of your soils and certification that the proposed system will result in a zero increase in stormwater run-off.

WHY:

Stormwater management helps:

- Prevent increased run-off onto neighboring properties
- Control erosion
- Groundwater recharge to replenish aquifer and general water supply

HOW:

To control stormwater run-off, installation of either a rain garden or a sub-surface dry well are the most common stormwater management systems. Both require a design

conforming to engineering standards. The type of stormwater management system is usually determined by existing site conditions such as soil types, surface grades, and the allowable space.

RAIN GARDEN:

- A rain garden is a vegetated depression in the ground surface which allows for stormwater collection. They are typically used when a level area is available and sub-surface conditions are not acceptable for a dry well.
- The type of vegetation within a Rain Garden is chosen to handle the extreme moisture and concentrations of nutrients, which are found in stormwater runoff.
- They are best placed downhill from the impervious surfaces to allow for the gravity conveyance of the run-off to the rain garden.
- Rain gardens can become an attractive landscape addition to your property while at the same time controlling the stormwater run-off.
- The ideal plants to use are ones, which are native to the environment in which you live.




STORMWATER MANAGEMENT

DRY WELL:

A dry well is a subsurface storage facility that receives and temporarily stores stormwater runoff from the impervious surfaces. Discharge of this stored runoff from a dry well occurs through infiltration into the surround soils. A dry well may be either a structural chamber and/or an excavated pit filled with aggregate.

What is the purpose of a dry well?

Dry wells can be used to reduce the increased volume of stormwater runoff caused by impervious surfaces. Dry wells can also be used to indirectly enhance water quality by reducing the amount of stormwater quality design storm runoff volume to be treated by the other, downstream stormwater management facilities.

What are the conditions where this practice applies?

Dry wells are relevant only where their subgrade soils have the required permeability rates. Dry wells are not useful in areas where high pollutant or sediment loading is anticipated due to the potential for groundwater contamination or where there is significant risk for basement

seepage or interference with the operation of subsurface sewage disposal systems. Such adverse impacts must be assessed and avoided by the design professional. Dry wells must be located and configured where their construction will not compact the soils below the dry well. Finally, a dry well must have a maintenance plan, and if privately owned, should be protected by easement, deed restriction, ordinance, or other legal measures that prevent its neglect, adverse alteration, and removal.

What is the Design Criteria like for Dry Wells?

The basic design parameters for a dry well are its storage volume and the permeability rate of the subgrade soils. A dry well must have sufficient storage volume to contain the design runoff volume without overflow, while the sub-grade soils' permeability rate must be sufficient to drain the stored runoff within 72 hours.

A. Storage Volume, Depth, and Duration

The dry well must be designed to treat the total runoff volume generated by the dry well's maximum design storm. The dry well must fully drain the runoff within 72 hours. Runoff stored for greater times can render the dry well ineffective and may result in anaerobic conditions, odor, and both water quality and mosquito breeding problems. The bottom of the dry well must be at least two (2) feet above the seasonal high water table or bedrock, and be as level as possible to uniformly distribute runoff infiltration over the sub-grade soils.

B. Permeability Rates

The minimum design permeability rate of the sub-grade soils below a dry well depend upon the dry well's location and maximum design storm. Dry wells designed for storms greater than the groundwater recharge storm can be constructed only in areas with Hydrologic Soil Group A and B soils.

C. Drainage Area

The maximum drainage area to a dry well is one (1) acre.

D. Overflows

All dry wells must be able to safely convey system overflows to downstream drainage systems. The capacity of the overflow must be consistent with the remainder of the site's drainage systems and sufficient to provide safe, stable discharge of stormwater in the event of an overflow. The downstream drainage system must have sufficient capacity to convey the overflow from the dry well.

DID YOU NOTICE THE TEAL RIBBONS?

September was Ovarian Cancer Awareness Month and, once again, volunteers in Montville Township joined thousands across New Jersey and 36 other states to *"Turn the Towns Teal!"* Ribbons were tied throughout our community, primarily through the efforts of the St. Pius X Youth Ministry and Montville Township High School Key Club, whose members provided tremendous service as part of the sixth annual campaign to raise awareness of this leading cause of cancer deaths among women.

Ovarian cancer is known as "The Silent Disease," because the symptoms are often vague and subtle, causing the cancer to go unnoticed and, in many cases, misdiagnosed. As a result, ovarian cancer is often confirmed only later, in its more life-threatening stages, when treatment options and chances of long-term survival are greatly reduced. If ovarian cancer is found before it spreads outside the ovary, the survival rate is 90%-95%. However, there is presently NO early detection test, so awareness of the symptoms is the most critical factor in fighting this deadly disease.

Ovarian Cancer Whispers....So Listen! Classic symptoms are: pelvic or abdominal pain or discomfort (bloating); vague but persistent gastrointestinal upsets; frequent and/or urgent urination; unexplained changes in bowel habits; unexplained weight gain or loss; ongoing unusual fatigue; back pain; menstrual changes; and pain during intimacy.

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

There is no additional charge for this service and please remember to remove all doors prior to placing these items at the curb (not in the roadway).

ELECTRONICS RECYCLING

In addition to the change in recycling collection, Montville Township residents will now be able to recycle covered electronics (Televisions, Computers & Computer Monitors) at the Lincoln Park Recycling Center, which is located on George Cobb Lane and is open Monday-Friday from 7 AM to 3:25 PM and Saturday from 8 AM to 4:15 PM. This shared service is limited to covered electronics; please bring only televisions, computers and computer monitors to the Lincoln Park recycling center.

MONTVILLE ENVIRONMENTAL COMMISSION WILL APPEAL TO RESIDENTS FOR INPUT ON ENVIRONMENTAL RESOURCES INVENTORY

The Montville Township Environmental Commission is in the process of completing an update to the Township's Environmental Resource Inventory (ERI), which catalogues the Township's natural features. This would be the most recent update in over twenty (20) years. The Commission will be requesting public input in the coming months to assist with the preparation of the document. This may take the form of submitting photographs of the local environment, identifying scenic areas, and attendance at a public workshop to discuss the document.

Once complete, the ERI will serve as a dynamic reference document that may be used by all Township Boards, Committees, Commissions, and residents. The document includes geology, hydrology, soils, wetlands, vegetation, contaminated sites and historic and cultural features. The ultimate goal of the document and mapping is to provide parcel-specific information related to environmental resources and constraints and for use when reviewing development applications and amending the Master Plan and Land Development Regulations.

Burgis Associates, Township Planning consultants, is preparing the base document, which consists of descriptions and GIS mapping. The cost to update the ERI is being partially funded through a grant from the Association of New Jersey Environmental Commissions (ANJEC).

REGULATION OF RECREATIONAL & COMMERCIAL VEHICLES ON RESIDENTIAL PROPERTY

The Zoning Officer reminds all residents that recreational vehicles and commercial vehicles are regulated by Township ordinances. The outdoor storage or parking in the open in residential districts of recreational vehicles, boats and trailers of any kind is permitted only if they are located in the side or rear yard, must meet setback requirements of accessory buildings, shall be screened from view of adjacent properties, and shall not exceed twenty (20) feet in length, eight (8) feet in width and eight (8) feet in height. Unhitched trailers are not permitted in residential districts. Additional standards can be found in the Township's Land Use and Development regulations found on General Code (ECode 360) on the website – www.montvillenj.org - or at the municipal building.

Permits are required for parking of commercial vehicles on residential property. Vehicles can be a maximum gross weight of 10,000 pounds, nine (9) feet in height, and twenty five (25) feet in length. They must be garaged or screened. Additional standards can be found in the Township's Land Use and Development regulations found on General Code (ECode 360) on the website or at the municipal building. The permit application can be obtained from the Planning and Zoning Office or on the website.

A REMINDER FROM YOUR POLICE DEPT: SNOW EMERGENCIES

Snow and ice removal from sidewalks and fire hydrants: Residents and tenants are required to remove snow and ice from sidewalks fronting their property within twenty-four (24) hours after a storm and to clear fire hydrants of snow and ice. In the event of ice which may be so frozen that removal would be impossible, the ice should be thoroughly covered with sand, ashes, salt, sawdust, or some other non-slippery material or adhesive so as to make the ice passable. If after snow and ice have been removed there is more accumulation, the twenty-four (24) hour period resets. Please help the Police and your Fire Departments protect your homes and businesses by removing snow from sidewalks and fire hydrants fronting your property.

Vehicle Parking: Whenever snow has fallen and the road is covered, no vehicle shall be parked on either side of any roadway. This remains in effect until the roads have been plowed sufficiently.


